The original trophy will hang in the ARS Klima Hall in Shreveport. Elton was presented with the take home trophy which Gary had signed. What a special win for the Buckeye District. Congratulations Elton!

In addition, Elton won the Ralph S Moore National Award for miniatures, and the J Benjamin Williams Miniflora Rose Challenge Trophy. His Swirly Pop entry won Miniature King. His Nancy Jean entry won Queen of the Minifloras and 3 of his entries were on the court. Wow!

Jim and Anne Hering won the Horace McFarland Memorial National Trophy (7 HTs) and the Herb Swim Memorial Trophy (5 HTs) plus he placed on the HT court with Ring of Fire and won miniflora Princess with Power Point. Congrats Jim and Anne.

Learning and doing my best to fulfill the responsibilities of District Director has not always been as rewarding as seeing how well Elton and Jim did in a national competition. In fact, this position has presented me with some serious challenges.

The first challenge was a pending ARS merger of the Ohio and the Great Lakes District (because no one from Michigan would commit to being District Director. This issue came to light in January of 2021.

While doing some research on this subject, I learned that Ohio, Michigan and New York are the only states that are their own districts and most districts are a lot larger than Ohio. I also learned that ARS reduced the number of Regions from 12 to 4. Our Regional Director is Linda Kimmel from Indiana. Please see the maps and also note that Michigan was not included in the outline.



I am delighted to report that the merger issue has been resolved. On September 23, 2021, James Riggle, from Kincheloe, MI, (which was a former Air Force Base and is now a small town, about 20 miles south of the Soo locks in the Upper Peninsula,) was persuaded by Duane De Dene, the outgoing DD to take the job. Many thanks to Steve Campbell and Duane for their communications with members of ARS at the National Convention while trying to get this matter resolved and thank you Jim Riggle, for volunteering to be District Director of the Great Lakes District!

My Second challenge has been to attend two ARS meetings, represent the Buckeye District, report what is happening at the National level and stay within a thousand-dollar travel budget. Jon Corken, the ARS Executive Director, and Marilyn Wellen, gave an update on the budget of Americas' Rose Garden and the Restoration Project in both Shreveport and Milwaukee. As I reported in the Summer Buckeye Bulletin, the goal is to make the garden self-sustaining. The good news is that work began on the last two circles of the Restoration Project Sept.10,2021, and the expected completion date is Spring of 2022. Pledges and gifts paid for the restoration. The concerning news is about the Operating budget. Although they are working with a minimal staff, there is a projected deficit of \$78,732 for 2022. Jon says if we can recruit 500 new members, we should be solvent.

In Wisconsin. The Board also approved the 2021 ARS Elections. approved the fourth edition of the Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements and also approved a revision to the language of the Declaration of Trust for the American Rose Society Educational Trust which expanded the EET to local rose societies, which encourages the opportunities to be brought to the Trust, and encourages the participation of local rose society presidents in an ARS Trust.

The Board rejected a proposal for the ARS to NOT endorse products containing imidacloprid as it is harmful to bees.

The Anne Belovich Rambler Rose Collection is being moved from Texas to the ARS Garden and where and how the rambles will be planted is being studied by a committee.

I will report on the Milwaukee Garden Tours and the Educational Seminars in the next Bulletin. I was not able to stay within the budget because of the cost of everything was high. Many thanks to Lori Hilfer who split the cost of the hotel room with me. I am not asking for a larger expense budget. I am simply reporting, the trips were expensive.

The Third challenge was to fill the District Officers and Chair positions. We, like other Districts, do not have an abundance of volunteers. We have some new people accepting positions and some who have had the position and have agreed to continue.

Our Officers include the President of the Buckeye District, Chris Brogan, our First Vice President, Susan Courter, who is also our Historian, and our second Vice President, Dave Starner. Cheryl Menard continues to be our Treasurer and has also accepted the job of Roses in Review. Elton Smith continues as our Secretary.

Please see the list of Officers and Chair positions at the end of this newsletter and thank those who have stepped up to do the jobs. **Our unfilled position is the new Photographic Chair.**

It is with deep gratitude that I am able to announce that Gary Barlow and Terri Lady have come out of retirement and agreed to stay on as Chair of the Arrangements Judges "Committee." Gary and Terri will continue to write the schedule and Elton and Ann Smith will take care of the show set up, making sure there is space for the different classes and the awards and trophies are at the show.

The Forth challenge is to figure out how to involve ALL Buckeye District Rose Clubs/Societies from around the state in putting on a District Rose Show. We cannot continue to put all the work of a DISTRICT ROSE SHOW INTO THE HANDS OF A FEW WHO JUST HAPPEN TO LIVE IN CENTRAL OHIO!!!!!!!! PLEASE WE MUST DO SOME BRAINSTORMING AND FIGURE THIS OUT. I will be contacting each Club//Society to discuss this.

The Fifth challenge is to come up with possible ways to increase our membership. Let me begin by reminding you of the old Girl Scout Song,

"Make new friends and keep the old, one's like silver and the other's gold"

We all love our show roses! However,70 million Knockout roses have been sold and a host of other "easy care" roses have flooded the market in recent years. In the words of Teresa Byington, if we want to "make new friends" to grow our membership, we might try to have program topics that interest them. For example, for our Spring 2022 District Meeting we may have 45-minute sessions which will be announced on our new web and Facebook pages,

Arrangements session/workshop

Make four to six arrangements with some using the new classification of ARGS (American Rose Garden Selections and from ARTS (American Rose Trials for Sustainability)

Photography session/workshop

Tips on best Photography methods plus an explanation of how the photo will be is judged

Lunch/ District Meeting

If we want to keep our current members, we must have interesting programs for them;

Buckeye District Issues for 2021-22

1. Possible Merger with Great Lakes District

According to Diane Sommers, the incoming president of the ARS, there is a good possibility that the merger Issue will be taken up by the Strategic Planning Committee at the November ARS Executive Board meeting.

This action is being taken because there is a rule that District Directors may serve only two consecutive terms and Duane DeDene, the current DD in Michigan has served two terms or 6 years and has been unable to get anyone to serve as DD. Thus, the Great Lakes district will be without representation and must be merged with another district so they are represented. Diane went on to say the changes to any District or Regions must be approved by the Board of Directors.

You can find this language in our Bylaws (Article VIII, Section 4). In this case, the Strategic Planning Committee would be tasked with creating any proposal for changes. Changes such as these are challenging and the SPC will want to have as much feedback and information as possible before creating the recommendation. Duane would play a key role in that as well as any District Director that may be impacted. Prior to that however, a few things need to happen:

- a) We would want to poll the ARS Members living in the Great Lakes District to understand what they would like to have happen. That will include one last call to action to determine if anyone is interested in taking on the role of DD. If someone is, then an election will be held of the membership. The current DD, Duane DuDene has a draft letter written that would be distributed to all the ARS members in the District shortly following the new board installation. (in Wisconsin this September.)
- b) We would also want to understand how members of Districts impacted (such as Buckeye) feel about the change. It is good that you have this discussion at your Semi-annual meeting even though there is no proposal at this time. Their feedback is important and understanding pros and cons is valuable.
- c) Using the process discussed Tuesday, a recommendation would be made to the board. There would be discussion on the recommendation and a Board Vote on the recommendation including any changes identified during the board discussion.

AMERICAN ROSE SOCIETY BY LAWS APPROVED BY MEMBERS, JULY 31,2021 ARTICLE VIII GOVERNMENT

Section 4—Districts and District Directors. Districts shall be established by the Board of Directors. One District Director shall be elected from each District, each to serve a three-year term. A nominee for District Director must be an ARS member residing in the

District from which he or she is to be elected. District Director must remain a resident of the District from which he or she has been elected throughout the term of the office.

Each District shall effect a District organization in accordance with bylaws approved by the Board of Directors. Changes in the District boundaries or subdivision of Districts to establish new Districts must be approved by the Board of Directors. Recommendations to the Board of Directors for such changes may be made by a Committee designated to consider such matters.

Other information for your to consider.

- -Ohio Michigan and New York are the only 3 states that are their own district.
- -Districts seem to be formed in relationship to population
- -The Buckeye District is small compared to the Rocky Mountain District which includes Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, and Parts of Idaho and Montana.

Duane has suggested that the Great Lakes District/State of Michigan be split into two sections. The proposed 2 re-alignment Groups are as follows:

Group1 -- Lower Peninsula and Canadian Province of Canada. It would include all current and new ARS Members and all current and new local rose societies. There are currently 142 (13 of which are in the Canadian Province of Ontario) ARS Members and six local rose societies -- Grand Valley Rose Society, Kalamazoo Rose Society, Lansing Rose Society, Detroit Rose Society and Metropolitan Rose Society in this Group. It also includes the Canadian Rose Society. This Group would re-align with and become part of the current Buckeye District.

Duane also shared that he believes that the strength of each of these societies is probably 15 to maybe 20 members at best. A couple have had some recent outdoor gatherings. As for rose shows, the District has had very few. Detroit/Metro would typically hold a joint show in June and Detroit is hoping to do a Fall show late in September. Grand Valley usually holds a show in Spring and Kalamazoo has held shows in the Spring. However, since Covid, operations have essentially come to a halt with the exception of the recent outdoor activities held by Grand Valley and Kalamazoo.

Group 2 -- This Group would encompass the entire Upper Peninsula of Michigan. This Group would re-align with and become part of the current North Central District





2021 Incoming President's Observations from the 71st Buckeye District Conference & Fall Show. Chris Brogan

Hi fellow rosarians. A summary of my first experience as a Horticultural Judge (apprentice) and overall comments of the entire event. First, the drive from Cincinnati was a piece of cake. 2.5 hours with very light traffic to the All-Occasions parking lot. A huge double tour bus was in front of me, which at first, I thought was a train! A live rock band is playing at our event I thought, but no it was Steve Campbell our outgoing District Director. What an amazingly talented guy he is and good luck Steve on your journeys to come. Sue & John Dickman greeted us but didn't recognize me nor Marisha (spouse) due to the "just in case" masks we had on. Boy will we all be glad to get back to some normalcy. Quick conversation with Audrey Palumbo, our incoming District Director and there's Jim Hering giving the Judging Teams the show rules and introducing the Apprentices to their respective sanctioned Judging partners and Clerks. What would we do without Jim Hering? A quick glance around the gorgeous large room at the layout and off we go. Time to eat. The buffet was okay and somewhat typical of catered buffet style meals. The food was warm and chicken breasts were huge and I loved the chicken gravy. After the rushed meal break, I took the opportunity to wander around the show exhibits before the business meeting started. Looked at the Top Table only briefly and then caught up with Debbie Lieske to ask her opinion of the photography exhibits. All pictures were 8x10 matted with black backgrounds and all just gorgeous. To my surprise all the exhibits were entered by Debbie. Wow. Maybe Debbie could be our first Photography Chairperson? Next rushed over to the arrangements, a personnel favorite of mine particularly the East Asian designs. We are blessed with some great arrangers in our District and non-better than Gary Barlow.

The business meeting is due to start and up first is the Microbial Science presentation with a science heavy series of slides and emphasis on organic product with lots of with/without comparisons to demonstrate these products do what the slides say. ODA Issues Quarantine for Spotted Lanternfly Pest

Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) today announced a quarantine to combat the spread of the Spotted Lanternfly (SLF). SLF is now designated a destructive plant pest under Ohio law, which increases inspections and restricts movement of certain items from infested counties in Ohio and other states into non-infested Ohio counties. SLF can spread long distances quickly by people who move infested materials or those containing egg masses.

Currently, SLF is only known to be established in Jefferson and Cuyahoga counties. Individuals traveling from an SLF infested area with items including tree branches, nursery stock, firewood, logs, or other outdoor items that pose a high risk of spreading the pest, are asked to complete a self-inspection checklist on ODA's website.

Nurseries, arborists, loggers, and other commercial activities may need to be covered by a compliance agreement in order to ship certain products out of infested counties. Please call 614-728-6400 for more information about compliance agreements for commercial activities.

The Spotted Lanternfly is native to Southeast Asia and was first found in Ohio in Mingo Junction in October 2020. It was later found in Cuyahoga County in September of this year. ODA has been working with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Ohio State University Extension, and the Ohio Grape Industries Committee on visual surveys, insect trapping, and outreach.

The Spotted Lanternfly was first detected in eastern Pennsylvania in September 2014 and was likely brought to the U.S. by imported goods. There are now established populations of SLF throughout New England and the mid-Atlantic states.

This pest is a great concern to the grape and wine industry. It is fond of grapevines, fruit trees, hops, blueberry, oak, pine, poplar, and walnut. Adult SLF are attracted to the invasive Ailanthus tree, also known as tree-of-heaven, while nymphs feed on a wide range of hosts. Both adults and nymphs feed on stems and leaves, causing sap bleeding and reduced photosynthesis, which can eventually kill the plant.

The public is the first line of defense against the SLF. Adult SLF will remain active through the first frost. These adult plant hoppers are roughly one inch in size, have black bodies, and colorful red and black wings. If you believe you have seen this pest in your area, please go to ODA's Spotted Lanternfly Information Page to fill out a suspected infestation report.

<u>STEVE CAMPBELL</u> – On behalf of Buckeye Judges I wish to thank Steve Campbell for serving as our district director for the past six years. Steve and Lynn have relocated to North Carolina, but I hope that we will see him from time to time at local, district and national meetings and rose shows. Steve, we wish you and Lynn the best in North Carolina.

<u>AUDREY PALUMBO</u> – Audrey is currently an Apprentice Horticulture Judge and as of September 13th is our new Buckeye District Director. At the October 26th meeting of the Toledo Rose Society she was honored as a **MASTER ROSARIAN** by the American Rose Society and the National Consulting Rosarian Committee.

HORTICULTURE JUDGING SEMINAR - A judging seminar will be held immediately following the District Spring Meeting on Saturday, April 2, 2022. Four hours of credit will be obtained by attending the spring meeting (2 of the programs will be good for 1 hour of credit each) and a two hour seminar which will follow. Check the Judges' Roster in this issue to see your seminar requirement status. We currently have three Apprentice Horticulture Judges (Audrey Palumbo, Marian Wyman and Chris Brogan), and I urge you to invite them to judge your local rose shows. Because of the absence of rose shows during the pandemic, they would like very much to judge shows this coming year in order to complete their requirements to become Accredited.

<u>TOP GUN</u> – Save Saturday, July 23, 2022 for our Top Gun meeting. The site is yet undetermined, but Satish Prabhu, who was scheduled to be our program in 2020 before it was cancelled, has agreed to be our speaker.

<u>2022 BUCKEYE DISTRICT FALL CONFERENCE AND ROSE SHOW</u> – is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, September 24th in Waldo, but contact District Director Audrey Palumbo if you wish another venue to be considered.

<u>LIVE AND LEARN</u> – In the Fall 2020 issue of *Buckeye Bulletin* I reported a severe infestation of downy mildew in the Hering Garden. I first noticed a very small amount of the disease in the fall of 2019 but neglected to start preventive spraying early enough to prevent extensive disease in September of 2020. After intensive use of Aliette and Junction (mancozeb + copper) control of downy mildew was obtained, but that wasn't until October.

I decided to begin downy prophylaxis earlier this year and started spraying with Junction the first of August in addition to my usual spray program of chlorothalonil + azoxystrobin alternating with mancozeb + propiconazole every seven days (I substituted Junction for plain mancozeb). I thought I would hold off using Aliette until I saw any evidence of downy. Much to my chagrin, about the third week of August downy mildew struck the Hering Garden like a thunderbolt – it was everywhere, most severely on hybrid teas, and

much less on miniatures, minifloras and floribundas. I immediately started spraying every three days with Aliette alternating with Junction (you shouldn't mix Aliette, which contains aluminum, in your spray tank with Junction, which contains copper). After two weeks I resumed my normal spraying program but substituted Junction for plain mancozeb and added Aliette to chlorothalonil/azoxystrobin. Now, in mid-October the downy mildew appears to be under good control.

What have I learned? I am going to take the advice of my good friend Elton Smith who recommends that I start my downy mildew prophylaxis in the spring in addition to my usual preventive spraying (when the bushes leaf out – usually mid to late April). I'm sure that it would also help if I planted the bushes further apart (more than 24"). I'll let you know next year if earlier prophylaxis solves my problem.


