One possibility is to include a Holiday Table setting arrangement class that might include Easter, Fourth of July, Thanksgiving, Christmas, etc themes using shrub or any combination of rose types.

It was suggested that we night be able to increase the number of people who attend the District Rose Show in the Cleveland area because there are more rose societies there than anywhere else in the State of Ohio. I called Jeff Sommer and Corky Thacker to ask if they would be interested in hosting a District show in their area. Jeff replied that they do not have the manpower to do it.

Would it be possible to put together a show committee in the NE region of Ohio?

Buckeye District Local Rose Society Advisory Committee Member

Getting more rosarians to exhibit and Increasing membership are just 2 of the local and national issues that the ARS has assigned to committees.

The President of the ARS and the Staff at Americas' Garden are working to take ARS digital. That includes programs on the rose that may be used during local meeting, taking the CR program and Judging schools digital and much more.

They are also working hard to reduce a projected \$100,000 budget shortfall. The member who has given \$50,000 dollars annually in recent years to the garden did not make that contribution this year. An Events Coordinator has been hired and she has increased the numbers of weddings but has not had enough time to contract for enough events to offset the shortfall.

There is also research being done to learn which companion plants in the rose gardens in order to have continuous color throughout the summer so there will be more color for wedding photographs.

An anonymous doner contributed \$350,000 to the gardens on the condition a pavilion with brick facade and pillions and a concrete floor be built to provide an area for more outside events. The cost of the planned pavilion with bathrooms are being drawn up by a local architect.

A Time for Roses is the name of the National Convention scheduled for May 5-7, 2023 in Shreveport.

The Buckeye District Spring Meeting is scheduled for April 15, 2023 at Waldo.

Thoughts from your outgoing Buckeye District President.

Saturday, September 24th was my last day as Buckeye District President. I have to say the major take aways were the chance to rub shoulders with some of the best rosarians and arrangers in the district, and to pick up friends that I wouldn't have got to know as well. When you are an Officer, you make extra effort to attend both the Spring and fall meetings. At the risk of offending my Cincinnati rosarians, the size, variety, and quality of roses exhibited "up there" is truly better, at this last show I observed the huge buckets of roses being taken home by those that wanted them, and the overall view of those roses was breathtaking. The arrangements are more similar in that they both are of a high quality in design particularly in the freestyle and oriental classes. The traditional classes, due the rose quality, is probably more visually attractive at the district events. Organizationally, the two events are similar although Cincinnati's number of classes has been pruned down significantly compared to the large number of classes at the district. Both events run smoothly thanks to fabulous organizers (Special mention to Brian Burley who is both smart and organized). My intention is to add an Arrangement section to the rosesgrowandshow.com website after getting prices and permission.


The apprenticeship judging experience, which consisted of 5 shows, was great fun and at each show with a different judge I learned so much. Different judges had different styles, but all were very detailed and took the time to ask me and teach me what to look for and various methods to spot the winners. The court selections are obviously the most time consuming and definitely took there toll physically on some judges. Especially when you must pick Queen, King, Princess, and Prince. Round and round we go and that sore spot on your body begins to hurt more. The reasons we do this is critical to rewarding that special exhibitor who deserves is moment in the sun and to reward those special roses and their owners their just reward. It would be a good idea to think about this process and see if we can reduce the time to pick.

I wish the Buckeye Officers the best going forward and wish to thank Audrey and Jim particularly for their guidance and enthusiasm in supporting the rest of us to be our best. EXHIBITOR'S ROSE CULTURE - MY WAY - Jim Hering

I was asked to briefly outline what I consider to be important elements of rose culture in a midwestern garden to produce roses suitable for exhibition.

ROSE PLANTS – GRAFTED VS OWN ROOT

I prefer grafted or budded plants for for large flowered roses because they become productive plants much quicker than own root plants. The most popular root stock in the Mid-West is multiflora. Fortuniana absorbs more nutrients and generally produces more blooms, but it is very winter tender, so I prefer multiflora. Miniatures and minifloras are usually on their own roots which makes them very winter hardy.

SOIL AND WATER

I prefer a sandy-loam soil which makes planting easy and promotes more extensive root systems. My beds contain a very low percentage of clay which results good drainage but poor water retention and necessitates frequent watering. The most important factor is the pH of the soil – ideally it should be between 6 and 6.5. Check the pH with a soil sample or a pH meter and add lime if it is too low or sulfur if too high. I water every day with an automatic irrigation system except when it rains. Roses like rain best.

<u>FERTILIZATION</u> (roses are heavy feeders!)

I love to use organic fertilizers, and I start with them in the spring as soon as I remove winter protection. I use Mills Magic Rose Mix which contains alfalfa meal, bone meal, cottonseed meal, blood meal, feather meal and fermented citrus rinds, two cups around each large flowered plant and one cup around each mini/minflora. It's important to start early in the spring even though the soil is still not warm because it takes time for bacteria to convert organics to compounds that can be absorbed by the plants.

When the plants begin to leaf-out, I begin using balanced granular garden fertilizer (not sustained release) (eg. 12-12-12), about ¾ cup per large flowered plant and ¼ cup per mini/miniflora once per month. I rarely use sustained release fertilizer (unless some is on sale at a great price) because its life span depends upon climatic conditions – temperature and rainfall, and I don't know how long it will last. I make sure that the plants get plenty of water so that the nitrogen doesn't burn the foliage.

I'm a great believer in alfalfa tea which I apply at least every month during the growing season. I put 12 cups of alfalfa pellets in an old pillow case, tie the open end, making a large "tea bag" and place the alfalfa bag in a 32 gallon garbage can of water. It steeps for 2-3 days and then is ready to apply to the plants, about one gallon per large flowered plant, using a sump pump and garden hose. When I make the "tea", I add two cups of Miracle Gro to each 32 gallons and every other month two cups of Epsom salt (magnesium sulfate). An alfalfa "tea bag" can be used for a second barrel of alfalfa tea. Alfalfa contains triacontanol which promotes long stems and basal breaks.

At least twice each summer I will fertilize two weeks after alfalfa tea with fish emulsion/kelp 2 cups, either Protilizer or Microbe Remedy (both with beneficial microbes and microrizae fungi) and soluble fertilizer such as Monty's Joy Juice in 32 gallons water, one gallon per bush by sump pump to each bush.

<u>SPRAY PROGRAM</u> (Atomist electric sprayer – I like it because it puts out a very fine spray, droplets averaging 20 microns in size, and less chemicals are used. I spray 1000 roses with 4 gallons of spray mixture. The only problems are that the sprayer contains 2 gallons of spray which is heavy to carry over your shoulder and dragging an electric cord around the garden is a nuisance.)

<u>Insecticides</u> – I use insecticides only when there is a specific indication. Safari (Dinotefuran) 1 teaspoon is spread around each bush the last week in April to kill midge grubs. Late in July I apply a soil drench of Cyonara (Lambda cyhalothrin) as a second preventive treatment for midge. In late summer I spritz just the buds with Orthene as they are beginning to show color to prevent thrip damage. When Japanese beetles are prevalent, I spray once or twice with Sevin. I use miticides (Avid or Floramite or Forbid or Shuttle) (Floramite and Forbid are also ovicides) only in the severe heat of summer when spider mites are suspected

<u>Fungicides</u> are sprayed for black spot and powdery mildew prevention every seven days from late April until the first hard frost, which is usually in mid-October. A surface agent and a systemic are used together every week, alternating propiconazole (systemic) and mancozeb (surface) with trifloxystrobin or azoxystrobin (systemic) and chlorothalonil (surface) to prevent resistance of fungi to the chemicals. Starting just this year I have added either Alliette, Subdue or Junction (mancozeb + copper) to the spray each week because of a severe, devastating infestation with downy mildew last year.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u> – If you intend to grow bushes for exhibition and fertilize frequently, avoid the mistake I made. Don't plant bushes too close together because the plants grow large and this prevents air circulation which facilitates black spot In spite of frequent spraying. My bushes are planted on 24 inch centers which is much too close. I recommend at least 36 inch centers (36 inches apart).
