IN MEMORIAM DR. JOHN T. DICKMAN

EDUCATOR, ROSARIAN, AUTHOR AND ALWAYS A GENTLEMAN

October 27, 1927 – September 30, 2024

John is best known and loved by rosarians for the decades of his monthly columns in *A merican Rose*, but is also well known in the scientific world as Senior Editorial Advisor for Editorial Operations at Chemical Abstracts Service. He was born in Hamilton, Ohio and has lived in central Ohio all of his life except for two years in the U.S. Army (Korea) from 1953-1955. Following graduation from The Ohio State University in 1950, John taught chemistry and physics at Urbana (OH) High School before serving in the Army. Soon after being discharged John enrolled in graduate school at OSU and in 1956 married Sue Thrasher who, incidentally, had been a student of his in Urbana. John and Sue have a daughter, Ann, a son, Bill, and two grandsons, Lucas and Henry. In 1960 he received his PhD in physiological chemistry from OSU and began 30 years of service at Chemical Abstracts during which he published nine articles dealing with biochemistry and served as a Consultant to the National Science Foundation and as a Teaching Associate at The Ohio State University.



When John retired in 1990, he began writing about his other avocation (in addition to roses) German culinary arts. John had grown up in New Bremen, Ohio, a German-American community, and in 1998 he published *A Taste of Tradition – New Bremen Memories from the Kitchen* and in 2001, *Recipes & Reminiscence - Culinary Memories of a German Heritage*.

After joining the American Rose Society in 1967, rose education was John's main interest. He belonged to the Central Ohio Rose Society, the Columbus Rose Club and the Delaware Area Rose Society and served as president of the former two. Two of John's closest rosarian friends, Russ Bowermaster and Art "A.J." Sparks, were the same age as John, and they were fondly referred to by their fellow rosarians as "The Three Amigos". Now, all three have passed. John served on the ARS Committee on Training and Judging, the Publications Committee, the Editorial Advisory committee and the Research Committee. He also served as Buckeye District Chairman of Horticulture Judges and as Guest Editor of the 1996 American Rose Annual. John was a popular speaker on all aspects of rose culture and on rose philately. Most rosarians first encountered John through the "Beginner's Corner" column of American Rose which he authored from 1978-1982 and in 1990. The column was enormously popular and reflected his training as a scientist, his natural gift as a teacher and his love of roses which was fostered by his family. In the 1996 American Rose Annual John stated that art, science, religion and politics are the four pillars upon which the fundamental structures of all civilized societies are founded. He chose to focus on "Roses and the Arts and Sciences" as the theme for the *Annual*, explaining that art deals with beauty and emotion whereas science asks how and why and that all rosarians are at once artist and scientist.

When awarding John the prestigious Klima Medal in 2003 President Tommy Cairns stated "John Dickman has demonstrated sustained volunteer performance in rose education for the

last 35 years. His contributions in rose education have been made as author of articles on rose culture, lecturer on many rose topics, editor of educational publications and a member of national committees dealing with education, publications and research. To earn the affection and admiration of your peers denotes exceptional and commendable service." Over the years John received four ARS Presidential Citations and the Buckeye District Silver Honor Medal, was named the District's Outstanding Judge and Outstanding Consulting Rosarian, and in 2002 was honored with an exceptional mauve blend miniflora bearing his name, 'Dr. John Dickman'. John was the patriarch of the Buckeye District and was loved and admired by all who knew him. We will always cherish his memory and feel blessed to have known him. We offer our condolences to Sue and her family and our gratitude for sharing John with us.

John's philosophy of life was: "1. Have fun in life. Don't take it or yourself too seriously; 2. Be thoughtful and ever learning; 3. Appreciate the classical arts; and 4. Realize that it all rests on the contents of The Book."



Climate change is everywhere

Our oldest grandsons' wedding on Friday September 26, in Toledo had to be moved inside because of the winds from Hurricane Helene that was making landfall in Florida, *over a thousand miles away*. That wind even blew over all our potted plants at our home. Meanwhile, our youngest Grandson, who attends Brevard College 50 miles south of Ashville NC, was experiencing great amounts of wind and rain. His area was sparred the massive destruction but there was flooding, no power and little gas

Climate change has presented some difficult problems this 2024 growing season. First a very wet spring with continuous freeze and thaws, then very hot and dry. We are still in drought in NW Ohio. I know Jeff Sommer in NE Ohio and Carol Holtropc in Michigan were having problems similar to mine. Rebecca Shaw, CR Chair of the Northern California also reported "not sure about you and your gardens, but mine struggled this year. Blooms were few and some never got any real height on them until the blistering hot weather gave way to lower temperatures. I'm hoping everything makes it through this winter and comes back "like normal" next year."

Will some of you will consider keeping a journal of how the weather and growing conditions are changing? Changes began happening in our yard over 5 years ago. I kept saying I won't have any roses for the Toledo Rose Show scheduled early in June and then suddenly we had some. This year I entered maybe 5 or 6 roses compared to our usual 20 to 30 and I had nothing for arrangements.

In addition to keeping a journal, I am changing the fall and spring pruning since my first blooms were on last years' canes. Our roses are in clay so they won't get blown over at the height of 15 to 20 inches.

American Rose Society National Report

Easy Elegance Roses was the sponsor of the 2024 American Rose Society National Convention, held September 9-13, at the Crown Plaza in Providence /Warwick, Rhode Island. The new ARS officers for 24-27 include Craig Dorschel, President, Carrie Bergs, Vice President, Roger Brueckman, Treasurer, and Toni Simonetti, our new Northeast Regional Director replacing Linda Kimmel. Claire Bissell continues as the ARS Executive Director. I was inducted for my second term as District Director. Buckeye District members who attended included Dr Jim and Anne Hering, Dr Elton and Ann Smith (also their daughter and son-in-law) and Mark and Terri Miller.

The featured speakers included Mike and Angelina Chute who publish *the Northeast Roses Gardener* newsletter, www.rosesolutions.net and have kept some of the Walter Brownell Sub Zero roses available for sale. Those roses were available for years in plant catalogs as Midwest Gardening, Stark Brothers and Jung Seed. You may remember some of their names: Artic Flame, Queen of the Lakes, Curly Pink, Lily Ponds, Maria Stern, and Helen Hayes. They came on the market about the same time as Buck Roses.

Other speakers were Matthias Meilland, a sixth-generation family hybridizer, and Christian Bedard, the current hybridizer at Weeks Roses. Both Matthias and Christian spoke about the goal of hybridizing roses that are easy to grow. One change in the US is that the field trials are no longer in California. Weeks roses has them scattered throughout the country in Washington, New York, Ohio, Tennessee and Texas.

Future conventions are scheduled for Buffalo, NY, September 19-21, 2025, Nashville in 2006 and a San Diego /World Federation convention in 2027.

Congratulations to Elton Smith! He won the Ruth Tiedeman Memorial Arrangement Trophy at the Tuesday Sept 10 National Rose Show. I understand he won some impressive trophies in other shows this fall and also Best of Show. Please keep him in your prayers. He is having jaw surgery again and expects to be hospitalized for several weeks.







September 7, 2024 Fall District Meeting

Our Fall District Rose Show featured some fantastic roses in both horticulture and arrangements. That seemed like a miracle to me considering this difficult growing season.

Peter and Susan Schneider, Corky Thacker and I were part of a panel discussion regarding "shrub roses". As we were speaking, it suddenly occurred to me that everyone including all ARS members need to clarify the difference between "Shrubs" and Easy Care roses. As Peter and Susan pointed out Shrubs have been around forever. However, Easy Care roses came about after Europe banned pesticides in the 1980s. Defining words for Easy Care include own root. ever blooming, quick repeat blooming, disease resistant, fragrant, winter hardy, and self-cleaning. They are the ones that make up the largest part off all the roses on the market today and we really need to get to know them better.

If your society needs speakers, possibly some members could research roses offered by Kordes', Easy Elegance, Earth Kind, Monrovia or Proven Winners and present their findings or have discussions on the current AGRS and A.R.T.S. winners.



Buckeye District Directors Summary Report 2021-2024

Being District Director was NOT on my bucket list. Then Jim Hering called me four years ago. He had already called 5 or 6 people and needed someone to step up. My first term had a steep learning curve but I am now very aware of the issues that need to be discussed and find solutions.

The most important task is do everything possible to help keep the American Rose Society afloat and to increase the membership in the Buckeye District. I need to be able to brainstorm with my executive board members and explore new ideas for increasing membership and other issues.

I announced my resignation as District Director as of April 2025 during the Fall 2024 meeting. A situation had occurred the evening before the September 7 meeting and the stress got to me. Since that time, I have learned new Stress Control methods from the Cleveland Clinic. I now feel I am able to continue as District Director. I would like to review the 2021-24 events with you and list what I hope we can accomplish in the next three years.

The biggest issue in 2021 was a pending ARS merger of the Ohio and the Great Lakes Districts.

The issue was resolved **after** the ARS Convention in Madison, Wisconsin when James Riggle, from Kincheloe, MI, was persuaded by Duane De Dene, (the outgoing Great Lakes DD) to take the job. Many thanks to the former District Directors Steve Campbell and Duane for their work to get this matter resolved and keep our two Districts intact. This may happen again if we don't have a person who is willing to be District Director in both districts. Remember, Ohio, Michigan (and New York) are the only districts (states) that are not merged with contiguous districts.

Which By Laws? In 2021 when I asked for a copy of the District By laws, I was given several green half sheets of paper. The title was A Plan for the District Endowment fund. It was approved by the Buckeye District membership September 9. 2006 in Dayton, Ohio. On the first page it states "This is at present only a plan for the John and Berdine Walter's Endowment fund. With approval it may converted to a set of By-Laws". Please note that the Plan was never converted or included in our district by-laws

According to the minutes of the ARS, The Buckeye District Bylaws were updated and approved by the district members on September, 18,1994 and approved by the ARS Board in Mobile October 20, 1994.

The district bylaws were then amended by the district officers and delegates on September.11, 2005 and were approved by the ARS board In Memphis September 29,2005.

Our current by-laws are posted on our website. We need a committee to review them and recommend any changes.

The Buckeye District voted to recognize and fund Top Gun as an educational event. It had been funded by the individual societies or individuals previously. We need someone to host Top Gun in 2025.

The Buckeye District also increased the expenses paid to attend the ARS National convention/board meeting from \$1000.00 to \$1,500.

Creating and keeping a web page is far easier said than done. Chris Brogan suggested that if we wanted to get on board the social media train, we needed to contact Teresa Byington for suggestions. The district provided funds for a new website, got the domains of *buckeyerose.com*, *rosesgrowandshow.com* and *rosesgrowandshow.org* to take you to our new web page. Lots of information was added. We were on a path to digitize our Buckeye History also get the most important on the web page before our historian, Susan Courter, passed away. Currently, Chris needs the help of a few good reporter/techies to help keep our web site updated. In other words, we need a Digital Communication Committee

Involving ALL Buckeye District Rose Clubs/Societies from around the state in putting on a District Rose Show. *The* problem is that we cannot continue to put all the work of a District Rose Show into the hands of a few just because they live in *Central Ohio*. We have partially resolved this issue by having our fall show at All Occasions Catering in Waldo Ohio. The district pays the staff to set up the facility for the flower show which includes setting up and taking down the tables, plus the table cloths, setting up the preparation and dining room plus serving the meal. However, the members of the Columbus and Delaware Societies bring and remove the show supplies. We have partially solved that problem by emphasizing that everyone who attends the Fall District Rose Show is needed to help clean up! A solution is still needed.

Revocation of the Buckeye District EIN (Not for profit) number. Some of our district societies have their own number and are up to date on the annual reports. There had been a lot of confusion over the years but we now have the documentation that we must submit a report to the Ohio Attorney Generals' Office each year. They would not accept a report from Cheryl because her email address is associated with Toledo Rose Society

because she is also their treasurer and makes the annual report for them. Larry Schrock tried to get our number reinstated. For the past year I have had my tax attorney trying to resolve the matter. It seems if your organization owes money, the state will respond quickly. If it is a matter reinstatement, the responses are much slower. For those societies that have an EIN number, please keep reporting. For those who were denied because the district number was revoked, we are doing our best to get the matter resolved

The changes at Merrill Lynch We received notice in 2023 that we no longer have the same advisor. Since its' beginnings our endowment fund was managed by Mr. Anderson, the Walters investment advisor. It seems to me we need someone assigned to work with our new advisor at Merrill Lynch to help keep the endowment in the direction we want it to go. Originally, we had a Finance Committee but those two members are deceased and no one was assigned or nominated to take their position. We need to come up with a plan.

We need to complete a "White Book," a guide to what needs to be done when including concise job descriptions. Every position in our organization needs a complete review and/or updated written job description and their term limits in office. We need a person in charge of Photography and that position is not even mentioned in our by-laws.

Changes in District Officers. I want to thank Elton Smith, Secretary and Cheryl Menard, Treasurer, for their many years of volunteering. Both began their respective positions in 2012, twelve years ago. The American Rose Society is very specific about the numbers of years to be served. The ARS President is three years, District Directors are limited to two three year terms as are many other positions. The goal is to have a variety of members participate in the administration in order to get fresh ideas. More importantly the goal is to not have a few continually reelected or assigned to be responsible for the society/district. The responsibility should be shared.

I have asked Ruth Ann Jesionowski to be our new Secretary and Randy Lady our new treasurer.

Jim Hering also asked to have someone take over the Chair of Horticultural Judges, a position he has held for 24 years. Jeff Sommer has accepted.

I asked Chris Brogan to fill in as President because our first VP, Jennifer Davis feels unable to continue due to health reasons. Many thanks to Ruth Ann, Randy, Jeff and Chris for volunteering.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> – Elton Smith. The minutes of the 2024 Spring District Meeting were published in the Spring Edition of the Buckeye Rose Bulletin. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as published.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> – Cheryl Menard. As of September 7, 2024, the Buckeye District has funds as follows:

Cheryl distributed copies of the detailed report which were approved by vote of membership.

Committee Reports

<u>Buckeye Bulletin</u> - Mark Miller. Items for the Fall Bulletin are due by the end of October. Mark was congratulated for the Bulletin receiving a Bronze Award by ARS.

<u>Buckeye District Website</u> – Chris Brogan. Chris would like to be contacted if anyone would like to add or change any information on the website.

<u>Consulting Rosarians</u> – Audrey Palumbo for Anne Schlinkert. Audrey urged everyone who is a CR to check the registration list for accuracy and of dates in particular. There seems to be some confusion in the information from ARS and folks need to be assured that their information is up-to-date. The suggestion was made that two lists need to be maintained, one for Consulting Rosarians and one for Master Rosarians. Watching a recorded video does not count for credit as a CR member. Credit is given only for live webinars.

<u>Historian</u> – No report. Susan Courter, the previous Historian, suddenly passed away, as noted above.

<u>District Rose Show</u> – Dr. Jim Hering. The 2025 District Business Meeting and Rose Show is normally held the third weekend in September, but no exact date or location has been scheduled. A volunteer local society is needed to host next year's event.

<u>Horticulture Judges</u> – Dr. Jim Hering. Currently there are 21 horticulture judges and one apprentice in the Buckeye District. Jim encouraged everyone to attend webinars to keep credits up to date. Judging schools are no longer offered online.

Arrangement Judges – Terri Lady. No report.

Outstanding Judge Award – Dr. Jim Hering. The Outstanding Judge Award for 2023 was presented to Corky Thacker.

<u>Top Gun</u> – Dr. Jim Hering. Jim would like to have a Top Gun meeting in the summer of 2025. However, a host individual or society is needed. Jim is willing to contact the speakers.

<u>Prizes and Awards</u> - Dr. Jim Hering. The 2024 Consulting Rosarian Award was presented to Dave Wisniewski, a member of the Toledo Rose Society. The Silver Honor Medal, which is decided by a vote of a member from each of the local rose societies and awarded yearly, was awarded to Chris Brogan, a member of the Greater Cincinnati Rose Association.

<u>Roses in Review</u> – Cheryl Menard. The dead-line for the Roses in Review report is September 24, 2024. Even if no roses on the list are grown, please submit a report indicating such.

<u>Local Rose Society Advisory Committee</u> – Dave Starner. No report.

Old Business – Audrey Palumbo, Buckeye District Director.



Shrubs – The answer to a prayer?

I attended September 7th Buckeye Show and business meeting and after the show there was a table discussion on shrubs. The experts included Peter and Susan Schneider plus Jim Hering and Corky Thacker, with each offering there favorites. The favorites included mention of new and longtime breeders: Ping Lim, David Austin, Buck and Kordes. It was also pointed out that spraying roses with pesticides is illegal in Europe, including Germany and Scandinavia. So, naturally to keep selling roses the no spray shrubs are front and center. Roses that the panel experts and input from the audience particularly liked were: Pink Surprise, Camille Rose, Land Lust, Lady of Shallot, Florentine, Henry Hudson, Peter John, Lady Elsie May, Aloha, Viking Queen, Gerabeck Bailley and Bolero. Many of the above are relatively newly introduced or just favorites when grown in Ohio. See below for additional information on this fabulous selection of roses that require less work and overall, less cost. The list I resurrected from some old files after listening to the Buckeye discussion plus it reminded me of a dear friend who has long passed – Ben Browning. Many of our very best exhibitors largely ignore shrubs but the public would prefer this breed of low maintenance roses, but simply do not know.

Classic Shrub Roses

What in the world are Classic Shrubs? They include several classifications of older shrub rose that are not currently getting much attention by rose breeders; hence the name Classic Shrubs. Most rose shows now include the class Classic Shrubs. They generally include the Hybrid Rugosas, Hybrid Musks and Hybrid Kordesii shrubs. These varieties can be used as mass plantings, hedges, border plantings, specimen plants and in the case of Hybrid Kordesiis, as climbers. Let's take a look at each of these categories.

Hybrid Rugosa Roses

Hybrid Rugosa roses are a result of crossing one of the Rugosa Species (Rosa Rugosa, Rosa Rugosa Rubra or Rosa Rugosa Alba) with some other cultivar. The Rugosa Species are repeat blooming, hardy and almost completely disease free. These are tremendous advantages for garden shrubs, as they provide blooms throughout the growing season, and are relatively maintenance free. The Rugosa species are native to Northeast Asia and Japan, but naturalize themselves very readily in the United States, often being seen growing freely on the seashore, and even as far north as Maine. The cells of the Rugosas have the capability of supercooling, which is the ability of a plant cell, when faced with cooler temperatures and shorter daylight hours, to deplete itself of water until only a thin film remains around the inside of the cell membrane. The thin film of water remains elastic, allowing the cell to take extremely cold temperatures without the deadly effect of cell moisture freezing, crystallizing, expanding and rupturing the cell membrane, which kills the cell. They are so winter hardy, that Dr. Felicitas Svedja of Canada, made them a major component in her breeding of the Canadian Explorer series of hardy rose shrubs.

Rugosa roses are characterized by their crinkly, dark green foliage, which in most cases, is almost disease free. Rugosa roses are sensitive to the sprays used to control disease and insects in our rose gardens, so when spraying, avoid getting the spray on your Rugosas.

Some recommended Rugosas/Hybrid Rugosas are:

Hybrid Musk Roses

Another group of Classic Shrub roses recognized by the American Rose Society is the Hybrid Musk class. The Hybrid Musk class contains some of the most beautiful roses of all. This class has an interesting background. It started in Germany in 1902. Peter Lambert raised a seedling from the Hybrid Multiflora rose Aglaia, which was a cross of Rosa Multiflora X Reve d'Or a buff colored Noisette rose. The result was Trier, a repeat blooming large shrub that bore clusters of creamy white, single flowers tinged with pink.

The scene then shifts to England, where the Reverend Joseph Pemberton, a retired Anglican clergyman who had a passion for roses, began using Trier and certain other Polyanthas and Noisettes to cross with different Hybrid Teas, Tea roses and Noisettes. The result was a number of excellent shrub roses that bloom repeatedly, have an arching shape, and bear large clusters of flowers. Most of them also have a strong musk fragrance that is quite pleasant. When Pemberton died, his rose breeding work was carried on by his gardener and housekeeper, J. A. and Ann Bentall. While they introduced only a few roses to the commercial market, it is interesting to note that of the eight (8) roses most frequently listed in catalogs, two (2), The Fairy and Ballerina were hybridized by Bentall. Beyond that, Wilhelm Kordes did some work with Hybrid Musk's in the '30's and '40's, and more recently, Louis Lens of Belgium has been working to produce some modern Hybrid Musk's. Ralph Moore, the father of American miniature roses even introduces a few before his death.

In growth habit, the Hybrid Musk's are medium height shrubs with arching canes and large clusters of flowers. Most also have a strong musk fragrance. They are winter hardy and disease resistant and will tolerate more shade than most roses. They also repeat bloom freely. They make wonderful landscaping roses and with a little persuasion, will even produce some stunning heads of cut flowers for the kitchen or living room. They are greatly underused.

Whereas not much breeding has been done within the Hybrid Musk class, one (1) of the Hybrid Musk's can be found in the blood lines of nearly all of the Floribunda roses in commerce today, as well as in many of David Austin's English roses. That Hybrid Musk rose is Robin Hood, a Pemberton rose introduced in 1927. Robin Hood is truly one of the great stud roses of all time, and in addition to that is an excellent garden rose. Planted in a cluster of three (3), they can create a mound of flowers five (5) feet high and about 12 to 15 feet wide. Plant some Lamb's Ear at their base and you have a very striking display.

Hybrid Musk's make excellent hedge roses, are good in the mixed border or as a specimen planting and can be used in places where sunlight is marginal for other roses.

Hybrid Kordesii Roses

Hybrid Kordesii roses are descended from Rosa Kordesii, a relatively new species rose that resulted in culture as a result of spontaneous chromosome doubling in a R. rugosa X R. wichuraiana hybrid named Max Graf. Since Wilhelm Kordes was the nurseryman who did the crossings and made the discovery, he had the species rose named after himself. Further breeding using this new species resulted in a new class of hybrids, which are extremely winter hardy and disease resistant and have shiny, holly-like foliage. It should be noted that Max Graf is a Hybrid Rugosa, which was the result of a cross of R. rugosa X R. wichuraiana and is a good ground cover rose.

The Hybrid Kordesii have been further developed by, most notably, Felicitas Svejda of Agriculture Canada. Her best-known Hybrid Kordesii is Champlain, which is an excellent shrub rose. I grow Dortmund in my garden and can attest to its beauty, health and hardiness.

Some recommended Hybrid Kordesii are listed below:

Champlain	8.5	Dark red, 4' X 4', Svejda - light fragrance, good repeat bloom.
Dortmund	9.1	Medium red with a white eye, 6'X 6' as a shrub or about 10' as a climber; Kordes; Light fragrance; Beautiful holly-like foliage. Single blooms in large clusters. Hardy and vigorous. Highly recommend.
Heidelberg	8.6	Medium red, 6' X 6' as a shrub or about 10' as a climber; Kordes; Beautiful bright crimson double blooms with high centers; Shiny foliage; Hardy and vigorous; A good one.
llse Krone Superior	7.9	Pure white, 6' X 6' as a shrub or about 10' as climber; Kordes; Very fragrant; Dark shiny foliage; Vigorous and hardy.
John Cabot	8.8	Medium red, 6' X 6' as a shrub or about 9' as climber. Svejda. Fragrant, double blooms in clusters; Yellowish green foliage.

DR. JOHN DICKMAN (October 27, 1927 - September 30, 2024) – My first encounter with John was in 1978 through his "Beginner's Corner" column of *American Rose*. I had started growing roses just a couple of years earlier and eagerly awaited each issue of the magazine to see what knowledge of rose culture John would share. The fall national ARS convention and rose show in 1979 was held in Indianapolis, and Dr. Jack Smyth and I decided to take a few of our roses to enter the show.
